Sam Leak, director of Leicestershire Partnership NHS Trust's community health services, said that the additional 15 beds at Coalville come on top of a new ward in Loughborough and an additional five beds opened in Hinckley. We have an ongoing recruitment campaign to recruit the 225 staff for the

additional 52 beds across our network of community hospitals." Read more here

Health chiefs to consider reopening inpatient ward at Bishop's Castle Community Hospital

The 16-bed inpatient unit at Bishop's Castle Community Hospital has been closed since October 2021 due to a struggle recruiting the amount of staff needed to run the service safely. However, following a protest from the Save Our Beds campaign, the trust decided to expand services at the community hospital and implement a 'targeted recruitment campaign' for inpatient services. The past five years has seen a huge rise in the number of patients facing long delays at Shropshire's A&E departments. Over 1,000 people waited more than 12 hours in the A/E Department in Shropshire December

Loss of NHS Community Beds in Henley

Funding for seven care beds in Henley appears to have been switched from the NHS before they were closed. The short stay hub beds, which were based at the Chilterns Court care centre next door to Townlands Memorial Hospital, were axed in December. Ian Reissmann, who chairs the Townlands Steering Group, said: "In 2016, the 11 beds were commissioned to replace the Peppard ward beds in the rebuilt Townlands Hospital. We were told these provided 'step-down' NHS care by NHS clinical staff. The rules state that significant changes to NHS services, such as bed closures, must be the subject of a consultation. This allows the NHS to explain clearly the evidence to support the changes and the community and patients the opportunity to scrutinise the proposals to ensure patient need is being met.

"The sequence of events since 2015 has resulted in the de facto closure of NHS beds without the mandatory consultation and the protection and safeguards. We consider this to be unacceptable. "The solution is simple: rather than argue about historic, arcane details, the only way forward is to hold a consultation in which the proposals are presented by the care board, including the supporting evidence so the community can scrutinise and consider whether patient need is being met in a way which is fair to all." Get Creative

Dr Bob Liddell, GP in Turriff and for many years a member of the Scottish Association of Community Hospitals, has had a letter published in The Scotsman commenting on the need for well resourced community hospitals.

"I read with a heavy heart of the plight of people who had to wait up to 80 hours for care over the festive period. Part of the answer lies in having a network of locally based and well resourced primary care centres, largely using existing premises, where patients can be seen with minor injuries and the range of acute illnesses normally dealt with by GPs. In rural areas community hospitals provide the ideal focus for out of hours emergency care – including, for suitable patients, inpatient care. They

should be supported and opened, not closed, regarded only as a great source of "savings"." (Dr) Robert W Liddell, Turriff, Aberdeenshire published in The Scotsman 11th January 2024
